##### **Best Practice I**

##### **1. Title of the Practice**

“Pursuit of Academic Excellence” is a best practice of which the college can be proud off. The college has organized three UGC sponsored National seminars and one UGCsponsored faculty development programme. The college has been the collaborating partner of additional two UGC sponsored National seminars. Additionally three seminars have been organized by the college itself.

The objective has been to:-

1. To disseminate knowledge among students, young academicians as well as faculty and staff of the college.

2. To create a platform where young learners and researchers get an opportunity to interact and share their views with the esteemed resource persons who graced the occasion.

## **2. The Context**

In 2016-17 academic session the college organized the college organized three UGC sponsored National seminars . The department of Philosophy organized a two-day National seminar on “Assessment and Relevance of the Concept/s of Marx ON 15<sup>TH</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> November 2016.. Eminent academicians both from inside and outside Bengal participated. Resource persons came from Ambedkar University, Calcutta University, Patna University, Ranchi University, IDSK , Viswabharati University, IIT Kharagpur and the like. The second two-day UGC sponsored National seminar on “Education, Skill Development and Economic Growth in India” was organized by the Department of Economics on 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> December 2016. The third two-day National seminar on “Strengthening Human Resource Management System for Sustainable Growth” was organized by the Department of Commerce on 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> December 2016. More than 100 participants benefitted from this.

## **3. The Practice**

Side by side with normal teaching learning practice the goal of the college administration has been to organize academic discourses between students and eminent resource persons regularly. Holding regular departmental seminars both in a formal as well as in an informal manner has emanated from this thinking. As such regular seminars and workshops are held in the college.

## **4. Evidence of Success**

Three ISBN accredited edited books have been published by the college. All the selected research articles by the Resource persons and participants have been published in these books.

### *Best Practice II*

## **1. Title of the Practice**

THE IT Services Cell of the college has taken a remarkable initiative in organizing a 10 working days long UGC Sponsored Faculty Development Programme on Free And Open Source Software (FOSS), the first of its kind in any West Bengal college on 1<sup>st</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup> August 2016. Hence the title of this best practice is “Spreading Awareness about FOSS among Teachers, Non-teaching staff and Students” .

## **2. Goal**

The primary objective has been to create an awareness among faculty and staff about the emerging trends of the newly emerging Free and Open Source Software. The need for developing scientific thinking and to train the faculty (both internal as well as external ), students and nonteaching staff on the computer packages using FOSS.

### **3. The Context**

It has been the planning of the IT Services Cell of the college to organize such an awareness programme which will benefit all the three stakeholders viz. students, teachers and nonteaching staff. Hence a proposal was submitted to UGC to conduct an awareness programme on the new and emerging trends of FOSS. The programme was arranged with assistance from Spoken Tutorial Project, IIT Bombay and Departments of Computer Science Engineering, Information Technology Engineering and Education, Calcutta University.

### **4. The Practice**

In the FDP spanning 10 working days, panel discussions were held on the role of FOSS in Higher Education. Lectures were given on Ubuntu Linux, Libre Office Writer, LATEX, Libre Office Calc, Libre Office Impress, GIMP, GNU PLOT, AUDACITY, QGIS. Seminar presentations by the participants were followed by Examination. Participation Certificates were also distributed. Resource persons included Ms Trupti More, Programme Officer, Spoken Tutorial Project, IIT Bombay, Dr. Amlan Chakrabarti, HOD, A.K. Choudhury School of Information Technology, DR Anindya Bose, Scientific Officer, Department of Physics, University of Burdwan and the like.

### **5. Evidence of Success**

The IT Services Cell has published an ISBN accredited edited book to commemorate the occasion. The college has been selected as a Nodal Centre for Spoken Tutorial Project, IIT Bombay. Regular classes with students are held on Spoken Tutorial on Saturdays after college hours.

### **5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required**

The main problem faced today is the paucity of space. Although two ICT enabled rooms with ceiling mount LCD Projector, five semi-ICT enabled rooms with projection screen and portable LCD Projector have been arranged, these courses cannot be conducted during usual college hours. Owing

to growing interest in students for such courses, therefore, a separate unit exclusively for such training programmes would indeed benefit the students.
